

Congratulations Jarod!

Jarod Wakefield, Senior Project Engineer at John Holland, was announced as the winner of the PWI Young Achiever Award for 2019 at the Australasian Rail Industry Awards held on Thursday 11th July. Jarod has been instrumental on the Sydney Metro Northwest project, being responsible for the delivery of the ballasted and track slab across the project.

As part of his award, the PWI will contribute up to \$10,000 for Jarod to attend an international rail conference. Well done Jarod; a very well deserved win!

The aim of the Young Achievers Award is to encourage younger members into our industry and promote knowledge sharing. We have now broadened the judging criteria to make it more multi-disciplinary so that it includes for all members who are involved in the numerous rail infrastructure projects that are being delivered at the moment.

The judging process for this year's award was different to previous years, with an additional interview and presentation. Following the initial judging of the applications, between 3 and 5 applicants were shortlisted to then present their paper to the judging panel. Each applicant was given 20 minutes to present their paper and then answer questions for a further 10 minutes.

Vale Geoff Clarke


Geoff Clark passed away on Saturday 20 July. He was diagnosed with terminal pancreatic cancer in October 2018.

Geoff was along serving member of the PWI Committee and he represented the country members for many years.

Geoff had a long and distinguished railway career, starting in Dubbo as the Assistant Division Engineer. He would later return as the D.E. He also worked on numerous projects and then as a Subject Matter Expert and Mentor. Recently he was the driving force behind Australia's first solar powered train which now operates at Byron Bay. This project won numerous awards, including the 2018 Innovation Award from the Australasian Railway Association, and Engineering Excellence Award from Engineers Australia, and an Award from the Solar Power Industry.

Geoff was an unique individual who always had a wide (solar powered?) smile and retained his boyish good looks. This may have been due to him being born on the 29 February 1966 and really only being 15 years old.

He is survived by his wife Kim and children Sarah and Andrew.

At the PWI Annual Winter in June, Ben Lombardo, Managing Director of Speno Rail Maintenance Australia received the 2019 President's Award from PWI President, Mark Harris in recognition of his outstanding services to the Rail industry after a long and distinguished career

Ben has been a leading pioneer and innovator in the Australian rail industry since the mid-1960s. He moved to Port Headland in 1973 with Shell Oil and then moved to Mount Newman Railway Line with Ultrasound doing ultra sonic rail testing

In 1975 he was appointed as Mount Newman's manager of the ultrasonic and rail maintenance contracts. In 1979 Ben moved to Speno, who at the time had no ultrasonic contracts in Australia.

Ben quickly took over the leadership of the Speno business in Australia and became their Managing Director

Ben developed and introduced Australia to world-first rail maintenance and inspection technologies and has driven technology development, innovation and the introduction of specialised maintenance technologies into the Australian rail maintenance industry.

Ben's company, Speno, has been a long-time collaborator, supporter and enhanced corporate member of the Permanent Way Institution in NSW with Speno Operations Manager and PWI committee member Mark White managing the Annual PWI Welders Award.

Speno have won many PWI technology and innovation awards over the years.

Ben has and continues to be an integral part of the Australian rail industry and his engagement at every level including with the Australasian Railway Association has demonstrated his personal tenacity to challenge the norm and drive change within our industry.



Technical Meeting Wrap-Up - February 2019

Our February technical meeting was held on 21 February and was sponsored by Middleton Group. Stephen Goh and Keith Middleton, with over 55 year of experience between them, provided an overview of EMC, Electrolysis, and Earthing & Bonding in traction railway systems before delving into the practical considerations of mitigation techniques and strategies.


From being almost an afterthought in recent years, Electromagnetic Compatibility (EMC), Electrolysis, and Earthing & Bonding have emerged as critical issues within

the railway network. The shift in focus has been caused by a number of drivers.

Safety is a key factor as one of the major challenges with EMC is for projects to meet medical guidelines and international railway standards while also keeping Sensitive Receivers (SR) within the manufacturer's permissible DC magnetic field limits.

A very interesting presentation in an area not always considered by rail professionals, but one that has real safety and maintenance implications in all railway systems. Keith and Stephen's presentation generated a lot of questions and discussion from the audience and the technical meeting was very well attended.





Technical Meeting Wrap-Up - April 2019





Northwest Rapid Transit (NRT) is designing and delivering Sydney's new generation rapid transit trains; building new stations and car parks; and installing tracks, signalling, mechanical and electrical systems. NRT is also upgrading and converting the railway between Epping to Chatswood to metro standards. NRT combines the experience of the world's number one commercial mass transit operator with Australia's most experienced railway contractors; including CPB Contractors and John Holland.

Our April technical meeting was held on 11 April and sponsored by Northwest Rapid Transit.

In a combined presentation, members of the Northwest Rapid Transit team presented the innovations, challenges and successes of the two signature elements, the viaduct and trackform, and the tunnels. Northwest Rapid Transit won the 2018 Steve Maxwell Platelaying Award for the Viaduct Track Slab – an outstanding achievement.

Oliver Kundigraber and Jarod Wakefield presented on the 4 km viaduct and trackform, showing some of the novel tools and processes they used to achieve both high quality and exceptional production rates.

Abdul Jamal and Jarod Wakefield then presented on the





construction and fit-out of the twin 15 km tunnels. Abdul highlighted the innovations in modelling and measuring ground-borne noise and vibration to selectively apply attenuating track forms, and Jarod spoke about the logistics challenge of track construction in the twin tunnels.

David Ashby, Principal Signalling Engineer at WSP discussed high speed signalling and train control solutions, sharing his experiences from Europe and Asia, exploring why high speed rail signalling is so special and presented alternative products and standards that could be applied to a new Australian high speed rail system drawing on international examples.
